Must spend money as allocated. Flood insurance must be obtained and maintained.</li> <li>Part of the 21-county Federal Disaster Area 1740-DR-IN in February 2008</li> </ul> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>\$7.5 million distributed in FEMA money to 1380 families in the '1740' Disaster Area; \$9 million in SBA loans.</li> <li>About 62% of DANI population is elderly, disabled, or has a serious medical condition</li> <li>88% of DANI clients earn less than \$40K per year</li> <li>First time ever flooded for vast majority of applicants</li> <li>DANI has partnered with Brethren Disaster Ministries in Pulaski County to provide supervision and labor</li> </ul> |
